Julian Wright:

Two different kinds of group chats. One kind is my family - dominated by one person.

My wife and I are friends with someone who is connected with a community that doesn't usually give out phone numbers without it being through their agents; like being at an enormous party with luminous beings. Hierarchies were implicit.

Deep listening in chat forums: is it possible?

If you're in a group chat with three people, you can hear back and forth quite quickly. Gives example of early 20th century European postal services: e.g. up to six postal deliveries per day... you could correspond in that way somewhat rapidly.

Carlos Montemayor: group chats might be intended to be intimate; but they are often substitutes for real interactions. Erosion of intimacy. The reaction you expect in a group chat is much more unengaged. Not a lot of expressive power. Opposite side of this is that we'd have even less contact. They shape our attention but they are also trap-like, with social media.

Larry Berger: Zoom is a more powerful way to connect. Interest in mindfulness in video call spaces. Way to resist fracking is to be autonomous in one's attention. And that is through disciplines of attention. Arendt's idea of citizen councils - e.g. of 30 people. If you want to start a fresh new approach to governing, you form citizen councils. The condition is deep listening - mindfulness and "relational presencing" (a term that Larry uses with a group he is involved with)

Larry: a discussion in an ancient format, like a sepia-toned photograph. In some cases the space is actually a listserv which is not quite a group chat, but it's a sequential conversation. I also wanted to raise the strange quality of them being conversational, in the sense that they happen in real time, but you can suspend your attention to them indefinitely. In older formats you can't go in and insert a comment historically, but now you can reply to old comments and edit them.

Caitlin: the ability to reply to individual comments within the same thread also does something your attention.

Larry: I recently had the experience of accidentally pocket-dialing, FaceTiming a group chat. It was awkward: it was too real, even though it was all still virtual.
